
#### **Courses**

Due to light winds from the SSW, the planned route was shortened and we motored to the start area for the last part of the planned route at the western tip of the peninsular SSW of Fethiye.



#### 25th September - Kalkan to Gemiler

It is 31Nm from Kalkan to Gemiler so, again, lots of motoring was needed before starting a short race in gentle NW breeze using the headland at WP1 as the upwind mark. This time the wind died and the positions were used to establish distance sailed (taking account of tacking) and corrected to give a result based on corrected distance sailed. We motored on to Gemiler and, due the the forecast of strong rain and winds on Thursday, we decided to hold the Roux Gourmet night on the north side of Gemiler as we had in 2014.

Again it proved the perfect venue. With an unusual but delicious entry of bread pudding, Denis bagged the gourmet prize this time around. The standard of cuisine this year was exceptional, so thanks to everyone for sharing such delicious dishes.



#### 26th September - Gemiler to Tomb Bay


For the first race, the finish at WP7 unfortunately did not actually exist. Most crews managed to use the rock near the SCM at WP7, or the coordinates to get a finish time and

We had a second race with "interesting" winds in the narrow channel.


Another great dining experience was enjoyed by the fleet at Zeytin Restaurant at Tomb Bay.


